Who we are

Calgary

Calgary is a city in the western Canadian province of Alberta. It is situated at the confluence of the Bow River and the Elbow River in the south of the province. Calgary is the third largest municipality in Canada, with 1.2 million people.

Calgarians are, on average:

- Young (average age of 36),
- Diverse (28% visible minorities)
- Growing we have thousands of new people arriving annually from across Canada and the world.

In 2019, For the 10th year in a row, Calgary has ranked in the top five of The Economist Intelligence Unit's Global Livability Index. For the second consecutive year, Calgary was named the most livable city in North America.

Liveable Streets team is pioneering for inclusive communities by establishing toolkits that encourage joint decision making and building capacity with community.






We live in an organization full of silos...

25 heads are better than 1...

Enter the Tiger Team -

A cross-corporate super team that meets once a month to boldly tackle problems that no one mind can overcome alone.

Anyone interested throughout the organization is always welcome to come to Tiger Team!

In just 2.5 hours the Tiger Team co-creates together to:

- + **Understand** the problem
- + Generate as many **ideas** as possible for a solution
- Prototype potential solutions a reality in a low-cost, quick and scrappy way
- + Get users to **test** and interact with the prototype to gather feedback and learn fast
- + Build critical **relationships** for the future

Tiger Team tackled -

How might we support citizens to create meaningful spaces in their communities?

And from the Tiger Team, ActivateYYC was born in May 2017 -

ActivateYYC, a program under Transportation Planning, offers micro-grants to community members for projects that encourage citizens to "walk, play and be neighbourly".

The community of Bridgeland applied to ActivateYYC to curb traffic speed and create a safer environment for all road users at their busiest intersection.

In the summer of 2018, 30 Bridgeland community members painted brightly coloured polka-dots onto the shoulder of the road and installed plastic traffic delineators.

This helped shorten the walking distance of the crosswalks and force vehicles to slow down.

ActivateYYC funded \$750 that went towards painting supplies, signage and a street use permit.

Cars now drive six to 7 km/h slower (which is a lot in traffic engineering). With the new lower speeds, any potential accident would result in less severe injuries.

Due to the success of this experiment, The City of Calgary will look at applying this to other intersections throughout Calgary.

We learned...we need to find ways to say "yes"!

The City of Calgary had initially said no to the Polka Dots project because we thought it would be a risky project.


...and the completed project was extremely successful!

The City of Calgary recognized that we continue to live in a culture of risk avoidance.

We needed to transform our approach to service delivery and find ways to say "yes" to the great ideas coming from communities.

We took this problem to Tiger Team and tackled -

How might we encourage our organization to embrace the right risks, at appropriate levels and at the right time?





Now we are tackling the risk culture...

The Tiger Team structure fostered a


combination of people to get together which otherwise would not have happened. For this round we partnered up with the Integrated Risk Management Team.

We used empathy and innovation tools to empower everyone and learned that:

- Risk is scary, uncomfortable and and assessment tools are complicated.
- By approving some 'risky projects' staff felt that they were taking on the responsibility should something go wrong. They felt burdened.
- + There needed to be a mindset shift on risk within our organization.

And a fun, easy-to-use risk assessment tool was born.

The Risk Assessment Workbook is a tool created to encourage City staff to embrace appropriate levels of risk.



The workbook is currently being prototyped with several business units internally and is publically (and freely) available through Outdoor Play Canada.

AND...!

It will be used for ActivateYYC 3.0 to say "YES" to even more riskier (and impactful) projects!
